# SYLVAIN SET TO SHRUG THE PAIN E

Sylvain Guintoli hopes returning to full fitness can give him the boost he needs to win the eni FIM Superbike World Championship.

The Aprilia rider goes into this weekend's round at the Nürburgring in Germany with a 13-point lead over Kawasaki's Tom Sykes at the head of the standings.

His lead owes much to the resilience the Frenchman has shown since dislocating his shoulder in a cycling accident. He raced through the pain barrier at Moscow and Silverstone, claiming two sixth places and a fourth from the three races in tenacious fashion.

Guintoli had been expected to undergo surgery on the problem during the gap between Silverstone and the return to racing this weekend, but has decided against it as the injury has healed well and he is eager to get back to racing in better physical shape.

He said: "I feel better than after the last two races, that's for sure. The first thing I did was to go to my surgeon to understand what was the best thing to do, whether to undergo surgery or to wait. We decided

not to do the surgery, so I have been doing a lot of physio and exercises in order to recover as quickly as possible and be ready for Nürburgring."

"I was far from happy after I got injured, and there was a lot of frustration looking at the challenge for the title. Everybody knows that in order to battle up front you need to be very fit, but in one way or another you have to train. I don't do motocross, for example, because I think it's too dangerous - but then I dislocated my collarbone while cycling! Those things happen, unfortunately, and I have to say that the Moscow round was a very tough one. I focused on doing the best I could and it worked. After all, I'm still leading the Championship."

Guintoli leads the standings despite not having won since the very first race of the year in Australia, and knows adding to his tally would be a timely boost as the season reaches its decisive stage. "I haven't won a race since Phillip Island, but I always do my best to fight for the win," he said. "Sometimes it looks like I'm in the position to do so, but then it doesn't happen. It's a very competitive field, and many riders have what it takes to go for the win."

Title rival Sykes, meanwhile, admits he was maybe too cautious in finishing 11th and seventh at Silverstone. He said: "I was not prepared to gamble too much, and we saw how easy it was for people to crash, so taking some points was better than taking none."

Kenan Sofuoglou admits he will need luck on his side if he is to win the FIM Supersport World Championship. The Turkish Kawasaki rider has closed to within 29 points of leader Sam Lowes after backto-back wins at Imola and Silverstone, and this weekend's round at the Nürburgring is the first of the four remaining races. But Sofuoglu said: "I will still have to be lucky to win the title because of the points gap, but I hope I can win more races."



# SUPERSTOCK 1000

Sylvain Barrier can retain his Superstock 1000 FIM Cup title at the Nürburgring this weekend. The Frenchman has dominated the 2013 season on his BMW Motorrad Goldbet machine, and two wins in the double-header at Silverstone last time moved him 36 points clear of Niccolò Canepa. If Barrier can finish this weekend having opened up his advantage to 50 points or more, he will secure his second title with two rounds to go.



# SUPER STOCK 600

Bastien Chesaux is on course for the UEM Superstock 600 European Championship title without winning a race. The EAB Ten Kate Junior rider arrives at the Nürburgring leading the standings by eight points after two podium finishes at Silverstone, even though he has yet to stand on the top step of the rostrum. But with no fewer than five riders within 25 points of him, a thrilling finish to the season is in prospect.



# EVO CLASS READY TO LAUNCH IN SBK

A sub-category will race in the eni FIM Superbike World Championship from next year. A series of new regulations include the introduction of the Evo class. It will follow the new Superbike technical regulations for all chassis, suspension and brake components, but engines and electronics will follow the present Superstock rules.

Among the new regulations agreed by the FIM, rights-holders Dorna and the Motorcycle Sports Manufacturers' Association, aimed at reducing costs, there will be a limit of eight engines per rider in a season, a limited number of gear ratios and a price cap on brakes and suspensions.

Manufacturers have also agreed to provide a complete factory-spec motorcycle package at a fixed price for the next three seasons.

# WILDCARD BRINGS SMRZ BACK TO SBK

Matej Smrz cannot wait to be back in the eni FIM Superbike World Championship paddock when he makes a wildcard outing at the Nürburgring. The Czech rider, brother of former SBK race-winner Jakub Smrz, is currently racing in the German championship, but will get the chance to return to world level when he races his Yamaha YZF-R1 at the German circuit.

He said: "Of course I'm very happy. Times are difficult, especially looking at the general financial situation. It is not easy for anybody, and that's why I am so proud of my team, and that we are able to join the SBK paddock. For sure it will not be easy, but I know Michael Galinski and my team are doing their very best. We have not had the best of luck in the International German Championship, but we are always doing our best, and I like that spirit."

# JEREZ CLIMAX AS BUDDH CANCELLED

The eni FIM Superbike World Championship 2013 season will now end at Jerez on October 20 following the decision to cancel the inaugural Indian round at Buddh, that had been scheduled as the final round on November 17.

The FIM said the decision had been made owing to "operational challenges" and that promoters Jaypee Sports International, the Federation of Motor Sports Clubs of India and the Indian Motorsport Marshals Club were working together to make the Indian round as safe as possible for the future, and will host domestic events on two and four wheels at the venue during September.

FMSCI president Vicky Chandhok said: "JPSI confirms its interest in going ahead with the race in the future."

## WEBB LANDS DEAL WITH PTR HONDA

Young Engish rider Danny Webb has been catapulted into the FIM Supersport World Championship, only days after leaving his Moto3 team. The 22-year-old from Tunbridge Wells has signed an agreement to race for PTR Honda in the remaining rounds of the Championship, despite never having ridden a Supersport bike before.

Webb said: "I have ridden a 600cc bike once before – it was a standard Honda at the Ron Haslam race school about two years ago – so everything is going to be very new. I haven't ridden at the Nürburgring before either, but I can learn fast. My manager started to talk to some teams at Silverstone about possibilities for next season. Then a week later we parted ways with the Moto3 team I was riding for, and PTR had a space. It was a fantastic opportunity for me, so here I am."

# SBK FLASHBACK: NÜRBURGRING 2012

Aprilia will be hoping for a repeat performance after dominating the Nürburgring round of the eni FIM Superbike World Championship last year.

Factory riders Max Biaggi and Eugene Laverty took first and second in race one, and were followed home by the ParkinGO MTC machine of Chaz Davies. And in race two, Welsh rider Davies (right) secured his maiden SBK victory, with Laverty again in second place. Leon Camier's third place for Suzuki was the only non-Aprilia podium position of the day.

It proved a key weekend in the race for the Championship as leader Marco Melandri fell twice, allowing eventual champion Biaggi to take over at the top of the standings.
